With many people looking for the same, it is important to be well-prepared, and to start looking early.


MetFilm School Berlin

Neon Wood has three properties in Berlin-Friedrichshain (Neon Wood Berlin Frankfurter Tor), Berlin-Wedding (Neon Wood Berlin Mitte-Wedding), and Berlin Adlershof, offering more than 1,000 fully furnished student apartments.

Prices start at around €630 up to €935 per month, and amenities include high speed internet, 24/7 gym access, community lobby with ping-pong and pool tables, spacious study areas, outdoor courtyards, a gaming room, laundry services, and a community manager.


German Housing Terms

Apartments in Germany are typically rented out without furniture. The listing will show 'Kaltmiete' (rent without utilities), 'Heizkosten' (heating), and 'Nebenkosten' (utility costs). You need to add all of this together to get the total cost of rent - the 'Warmmiete'.

Be mindful: depending on the apartment, you will need to contract energy, as well as internet, on the side. These are not included in your rent.

Rent in Germany is paid monthly and in advance. Your landlord will require you to pay a deposit, usually amounting to three rental payments. You will receive this back so long as you leave the apartment without damages. Your landlord may also wait until a new year to repay your deposit, given that heating and utilities are billed on a yearly basis.

- 3 Zi.-Whg: three-room apartment
- 3 ZKDB: three rooms plus a kitchen, hallway, bath
- Abstand: you have to buy some fixtures/furnishings
- DG (Dachgeschoss): loft apartment
- EBK (Einbauküche): built-in kitchen
- EG (Erdgeschoss): ground floor
- · HH (Hinterhaus): back of the house, so little light
- K (Kaution): deposit
- NR (Nichtraucher): non-smokers
- KM (Kaltmiete): rent without heating and utilities
- KN: kitchenette
- Nachmieter: tenant who takes over an old lease
- OH: oven heating
- Prov. (Provision): commission
- QM (Quadratmeter): square metre (size of apartment)
- Seitenflügel: side wing
- TG (Tiefgarage): underground garage
- Untermiete: sublet
- VH (Vorderhaus): front of the house
- WG (Wohngemeinschaft): shared flat
- WBS erford. (Wohnberechtigungsschein): subsidised housing, you are not eligible unless you already have a Berlin address and hold the necessary permit
- Wfl. (Wohnfläche): living space
- WM (Warmmiete): total rent (including utilities etc.)
- Zi (Zimmer): room(s)
- ZH (Zentralheizung): central heating
- Zwischenmiete: sublet / temporary rental contract
- zzgl. NK: plus extra charges (heating, electricity, etc.)



What you need to know

Viewing and renting an apartment

If you receive an invitation to view an apartment, confirm the date and time as soon as possible. Most landlords will not issue an invitation without having seen your documents first. If they haven't, bring copies of everything to the viewing.

The required documents are:

- · A copy of your ID/passport
- 'Mietschuldenfreiheitsbescheinigung': confirming you have not and do not owe rent to your previous landlord (if applicable)
- · Your last three pay slips
- SCHUFA Confirmation of Good Standing (if applicable)
- Written confirmation of security/guarantee to pay be someone else

If you intend to rent an apartment and have someone else guarantee your ability to pay, you will need all of the above documents from the person providing the guarantee.

If you are offered the apartment, you will receive a contract from your landlord. Make sure to review it carefully before you sign. After you have paid the deposit and the first rent, you can then arrange a move-in date.

Do not make any payments before you have seen the apartment and the person renting it to you.

Your landlord will then provide you with a confirmation of place of residence. You will need this document when visiting the authorities the first time, to do your 'Anmeldung' (Registration).

Viewing and renting a shared apartment

It will be somewhat easier to rent a shared apartment or student accommodation, but most will require at least a deposit.

Make sure that you are able to register ('Anmeldung') with them. Immigration authorities will demand the 'Anmeldung' to process your residence permit. You should receive confirmation of place of residence from your landlord.

Registering your address

Registering your address is the first thing you should do after moving to Berlin. Unless you are doing a Short Course, you must register with the local town hall.

You can book these appointments at service.berlin.de/dienstleistung/120686/

Berlin's public services are notoriously overwhelmed, so finding an appointment might require some persistence. New appointments are made available every morning (around 8am), so check early and repeatedly.

For the registration, you will need your ID/passport, and your landlord's confirmation of place of residence. They will then give you your confirmed registration, which you can take to your appointment with the immigration authorities.

Please note: this information is correct at the time of publishing, but may be subject to change.

If you stay at an address for more than six months, you must register. You should register within 14 days of your move-in date, but this rule is not enforced within Berlin.

By registering your address, you obtain a certificate of registration and a tax ID. You need the certificate of registration to apply to open a bank account, to set up an internet connection, etc. The registration requires a signature from your landlord or agency, and a valid ID document – such as your passport.
