- 3 Zi.-Whg: three room apartment
- 3 ZKDB: three rooms plus a kitchen, hallway, bath
- · Abstand: you have to buy some fixtures/furnishings
- DG (Dachgeschoss): loft apartment
- EBK (Einbauküche): built-in kitchen
- EG (Erdgeschoss): ground floor
- HH (Hinterhaus): back of the house, so little light
- K (Kaution): deposit
- Kalt: heating extra
- NR (Nichtraucher): non-smokers
- KM (Kaltmiete): cold rent
- KN: kitchenette
- MVZ (Monatliche Vorauszahlung): rent in advance
- · Nachmieter: tenant who takes over an old lease
- NMM (Nettomonatsmiete): net monthly rent
- OH: oven heating
- Prov. (Provision): commission
- QM (Quadratmeter): square metre
- Seitenflügel: side wing
- TG (Tiefgarage): underground garage
- Untermiete: sublet
- VH (Vorderhaus): front of house
- WG (Wohngemeinschaft): shared flat
- WBS erford. (Wohnberechtigungsschein): subsidised
- Wfl. (Wohnfläche): living space
- WM (Warmmiete): warm rent
- Zi (Zimmer): room(s)
- ZH (Zentralheizung): central heating

What you need to know

Renting Accommodation in Berlin

Before you sign your contract, you will have to provide a couple of documents to your landlord/agency.

These include:

- A copy of your ID or passport
- Confirmation that you do not owe your previous landlord (if applicable) and that you always paid rent on time
- Salary confirmation
- Bank statements
- Documentation of your credit history

Signing a Contract

Most landlords or agents will require you to sign a tenancy agreement. This is a legally binding document setting out both party's rights and responsibilities.

By signing this document, both you and the landlord/ agent have certain rights protected in law which cannot be overwritten by the contract. Make sure that before you sign, you understand all the clauses – you don't want any nasty surprises!

Registering your Accommodation

Registering your address is the first thing you should do after moving to Berlin. This can be done by making an appointment in advance at a Citizen's Advice Office (this can be made online).

If you stay at an address for more than six months, you must register. You should register within 14 days of your move-in date, but this rule is not enforced within Berlin.

By registering your address, you obtain a certificate of registration and a tax ID. You need the certificate of registration to apply to open a bank account, to set up an internet connection, etc. The registration requires a signature from your landlord or agency, and a valid ID document – such as your passport.

Paying a deposit

Some landlords request one to three months' rent as a deposit. The deposit is a safety net for the landlord in case you have not paid the due rent, or if there are any damages to the property which need to be repaired.

Guarantor

Landlords and agencies may ask you to provide a guarantor, meaning a person that confirms they will pay if you cannot pay.

Some letting agencies are not keen on letting directly to students, and in many cases will ask a parent or guardian to rent the apartment.
